History



The development of the Naskapi Constitution is part of an overall process of advancing **Naskapi Self-Governance**.

A Naskapi Constitution will set out the most important rules of governance, as well as the values and principles that will guide Naskapi institutions.

Since October 2022, a Naskapi Constitution Working Group was created and has held monthly meetings to discuss and develop the proposed content of a future Naskapi Constitution. Participation in these meetings is open to all Naskapi community members!

Here are some key insights that have surfaced during our recent meetings. It's important to note that the following content will not automatically be added to the Naskapi Constitution but serves as a foundation to stimulate discussions within the broader community!

1 Naskapi Values & Principles

- Language is at the heart of the Naskapi identity and is a constant concern in the Working Group's discussions. Measures must be taken to preserve our language.
 - Stories about the land are very important to the Naskapi identity.
 They must be highlighted in the Constitution to ensure they are remembered.
 - Respect Resilience Wisdom Honor History Caribou-Nomads – Bravery – Confidence – Teachings – Territory -Ancestors – Children - Grandchildren – Community – Knowledge.

2 Governance & Government

SOME IDEAS - PART 1

- Naskapi leaders, especially the Chief, should speak Naskapi.
- It is important that **youth be represented in the Naskapi government**, either as Councillors or on a youth committee.
- Naskapi committees' rules, including composition and rules of appointments, must be accessible and clear. They must be accountable and there must be consequences for non-compliance.
- Committees must publish minutes of their meetings.
- Council's relation with the committees must be clear and respected. Council
 may override the committee's decisions only if clearly authorized to do
 so.
- Conflicts of interest were frequently brought up when discussing the functioning of committees.

2 Governance & Government

SOME IDEAS - PART2

- The notion of family could be included in governance rules to prevent family members from sitting on Council or committees together.
- Certain or all councillors should be **dedicated full-time to their role**. As the population grows, so should the **composition of Council**.
- The absence of a **mechanism to deal with conflicts of interest** makes the community less trusting of its government.
- The discussions revealed the importance of having a neutral and independent mechanism or institution to monitor the actions of the Naskapi government.
- There must be a clear and accessible procedure for reporting a situation.
- Few people know the **Cree-Naskapi Commission**, its commissioners or what they do. The Commission makes a written report every two years, but does not come in person to explain it. It is not perceived as effective.

3 Education

- It is essential that the community, and especially students, be better informed about the **Nation's governance rules and laws.** There must be **greater publicity and transparency** regarding these rules and laws.
- The constitution process must be accompanied by an **information and education campaign** before the referendum.
- To set up new political structures and make them work, we need to be better informed and educated about the Nation's political history and how the Nation currently works.
- It is important that **children learn more than just the provincial education program.** They should also receive a **Naskapi education**, which can only be taught by being on the land. This important aspect of their education should be recognized by the Government of Quebec (Ministry of Education).
- Language should be central in the program.

4) Communication & Transparency

SOME DEAS-PART1

- **Increasing the accountability** of Councillors and committee members is a constant concern.
- There must be **greater transparency** and **communication** regarding the respect of the Code of Ethics and conduct of the Councillors
- Written minutes of all Council meetings, community assemblies, committee meetings, etc. should be kept and accessible. Access to information is central in our discussions.
- The community should have easy access to all public information and documents. Access to information is lacking and needs to be improved.

4 Communication & Transparency

SOME DEAS-PART2

- Minutes of meetings or assemblies should be followed up at the next meeting or assembly.
- Elders should receive specially prepared follow-ups, so that they
 understand the issues.
- There should be more people working at the radio given its important role in the community. The radio needs to regain an important place in the community.
- There is a constant concern that everyone's voice be heard.

5 Fundamental Rights

- The right to information is central to the discussions.
- It has come to light through discussions that there are significant concerns regarding **the state of freedom of expression** within the community. The importance of better protecting and promoting freedom of expression was central in the discussions.
- The **fear of speaking out** because of potential reprisals, such as job loss or harassment, was a constant theme in the discussions.
- No one should fear reprisals for expressing their political opinion.

6 Dispute Resolution

- Naskapis should have easier access to a neutral and independent dispute resolution body (instead of courts of justice).
- For criminal matters, there is an interest in **creating a justice committee** to propose alternatives to the mainstream justice system.

7 Elders

SOME IDEAS

- It is proposed that some Elders be members of the Council, or that an official Elders' Council be created and be part of the government.
- The Committee does not want a symbolic or "token" role for Elders. They need to be truly consulted on all matters.
- Regular meetings should be held with Elders to discuss various issues.

• Elders should have a central role in preserving our language.

8 Relations with other Nations

SOME IDEAS

 Discussions revealed a desire for more communication and collaboration with Indigenous Nations with whom the Naskapi Nation shares **overlapping traditional territory**.

Spirituality & Tradition

- Spirituality did not emerge as a major component to be included in the Constitution. Some said that it should not be included. Others said it is an important to talk about Naskapi spirituality as part of a larger discussion around Naskapi culture. This is a matter for further discussion.
- Impacts on Naskapi sprituality resulting from colonization, including religious institutions such as the church, need to be acknowledged.

10 Non-Naskapi Participation

- There is a reluctance to have non-Naskapis vote at the election or on any matters. This issue needs to be explored further.
- The constitution must focus on the Naskapi Nation and its preservation.
- Non-Naskapis who come to work or live in the community should have training sessions on Naskapi culture.
